

## **Wide Open for Business**

In its bid to become a modern, knowledge-based society, Uganda has become a beacon for the East African Community (EAC), boasting excellent technology and a driven private sector.

n English-speaking country that was voted Lonely Planet's top destination in 2011, Uganda has enjoyed an average growth rate of 7.4% in the last five years, thanks to booming manufacturing, construction, transport and communications sectors, as well as excellent macroeconomic management.

Governed by President Yoweri Museveni since 1986, the politically stable country is becoming increasingly competitive, as First Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for East African Community Affairs Eriya Kategaya explains:

"Uganda's financial system is still heavily dominated by the commercial banks, but it has grown rapidly in the last decade and financial intermediation has increased in the sense that the banks are lending out an increasing share of their deposits. As a share of GDP, borrowed money rose from 15% in 2000-01 to 27% in 2011. Bank credit rose even more rapidly, from 6% of GDP to 17% over the same period. In real terms, bank credit to the private sector has expanded almost five-fold over the last 10 years."

And, with natural resources that include coffee, fish, tea, cotton, milk, arable land and regular rainfall, plus small deposits of copper, gold and other sought-after minerals, Uganda is now gaining a strong reputation as a potential oil producer and a logistical hub for the region.

As with finance, the last six years have seen remarkable growth in all major ICT indicators, with GDP contributions grossing between 2.5% and 5%. Today, Uganda is looking to transform to an information society, to increase effectiveness and efficiency and build a solid ICT industry to become a major source of income for the nation.

With its modern infrastructure and products, Warid Telecom Uganda

Ltd. is playing a key role in this transformation.
